

Ethiopia is the second most populous country in Africa with 117 million inhabitants. Although it has been among the fastest growing economies in the Horn of Africa over the years, it now faces a number of economic and social challenges that have slowed its development.

In recent years, the country has been affected by persistent crises that have worsened the context. First and foremost, Ethiopia has to cope with the social, health and economic repercussions of the COVID-19 pandemic. Added to this is the conflict in the north of the country that began in November 2020, which has had a substantial impact on people's lives, livelihoods, infrastructure and the economy. The Cessation of Hostilities Agreement, signed in Pretoria in November 2022, is an important step towards stabilising the situation.

Ethiopia is affected by **recurrent droughts** that compromise its food security, with major consequences on the lives of people, particularly those living in the most vulnerable areas of the country. In addition to internal movements of people from rural to urban centres, it is essential to note that the country is characterised by international migrant flows as a country of origin, transit and destination. Its geopolitical location makes Ethiopia a destination country for many refugees from neighbouring countries and a place from which to travel to Europe or Saudi Arabia. In addition, the crises characterising the country are resulting in an increase in the number of internally displaced persons (IDPs), whose social and economic conditions, along with those of their host communities, are extremely precarious.

Unemployment remains a major economic and social challenge. With more than two million young people entering the labour market each year (UNDP 2022) and increasing informal employment of women in the national economy, Ethiopia is currently working through the Plan of Action for Job Creation 2020-2025 to ensure sustainable and inclusive employment opportunities. Attracting private investment and promoting public-private synergy are important elements for the development of small and medium-sized enterprises. A specific focus on young people and women becomes crucial to ensure fair and inclusive development.

In response to the ongoing crises, the **Ethiopian government has launched several development plans** (Ten-Year Development Plan 2020-2030, Home Grown Economic Reform) aimed not only at ensuring access to and quality of basic services, but also at sustaining the remarkable growth and transformation of the previous decade while facilitating the transition to a more private sector-led economy. The Ethiopian Resilient Reconstruction & Recovery Framework, a reconstruction plan targeting conflict-affected areas, is also being finalised.

ITALIAN COOPERATION IN ETHIOPIA

Ethiopia is a priority country for the Italian cooperation. Cooperation relations between Italy and Ethiopia date back to the 1970s.

A central role for the projects that this Office carries out is played by partners, including **local institutions**, **international and European organisations**, **development agencies**, **the private sector**, **and Civil Society Organisations (CSOs)**, which, thanks to their specialisation and capillary presence in the territory, make it possible to reach even the most difficult areas.

In addition, with a view to strengthening the "Italian system", the Addis Ababa Office has been collaborating with local authorities, research institutes and universities and private sector excellences, including the Autonomous Province of Trento, the University of Siena, the Oriental University of Naples, the Istituto Superiore di Sanità and Illycaffè.

In 2022, AICS Addis Ababa focused its activities on strengthening basic services with interventions on training, health, access to water, energy, and the creation of infrastructure and supplies to ensure quality basic services.

The headquarters also prioritised income-generating activities to support a recovery that enhances local production and distribution capacities, strengthening and improving them to ensure a higher value of agricultural and manufacturing products.

In the initiatives, special attention was paid to the most vulnerable population groups, children, youth, women and the disabled, and to the most vulnerable groups such as refugees and internally displaced persons.

In line with what was carried out in previous years, Italian Cooperation, with a view to the effectiveness of the aid provided, continued to provide timely, targeted and professional technical support to local institutions in the management of the activities of the initiatives financed.

- Support to social health services response to gender-based violence and mental health in Ethiopia. Total budget 7.2 MEUR bilateral donation with the Ministry of Health and CSO.
- Support to vocational training for employment, economic and heritage development. Total budget 8 MEUR bilateral donation with the Ministry of Labour and Skills, Ministry of Tourism, CSO and the United Nations Industrial Development Organization 10 MEUR bilateral credit.
- Sustainable urban development of the city of Jimma.

 Total budget 8.5 MEUR bilateral donation with the Ethiopian Government and 6.5 MEUR credit.

ETHIOPIAN-ITALIAN COOPERATION FRAMEWORK 2023-2025

The Ethiopian-Italian Cooperation Framework 2023-2025 was signed on 6 February 2023 for a total budget of EUR 140 million, of which EUR 100 million in credit and EUR 40 million in gift (a 12% increase compared to the 2017-2019 Cooperation Framework, which provided for a total of EUR 125 million, of which EUR 85 million in credit and EUR 40 million in gift).

The programme establishes two main pillars of intervention, economic development and job creation and access to basic services.



Djibouti is one of the smallest countries in Africa. With less than 1,000 km2 of fertile land and a rainfall of 130 millimeters per year, its economy is largely dependent on the international market. Thanks to the country's state-of-the-art port complex, trade is growing, especially with its main historical partner, Ethiopia. The country also has great potential in the tourism and fishing sectors, thanks to its natural and fishing resources and industry.

Djibouti plays a key role in terms of **migratory flows in the Horn of Africa Region**: according to data released by IOM, from January to October 2022, 156,087 migrants (96% of them from Ethiopia²) entered Djibouti territory, the first stop on their way to the Gulf countries. Some 23,000 refugees and 11,000 asylum seekers are registered in the territory, from Somalia, Ethiopia and Yemen².

Djibouti is also affected by the severe drought in the Horn of Africa, which has led to a serious deterioration of the humanitarian situation. According to a WFP report, the ability of households to access adequate food sources is estimated to have been reduced by **75 per cent by 2022 and 199,327 people are in acute food insecurity.** Drought also has serious effects on the transmission of water-related diseases: in recent years, partly due to climate change, cases of infectious diseases such as malaria, dengue and chikungunya have increased.

ITALIAN COOPERATION IN DJIBOUTI


The Italian Cooperation's presence in Djibouti dates back to 1985, when, in one of the capital's poorest and most crowded neighbourhoods - the municipality of Balbalà - the Italian Environmental Fund (FAI) started the construction of a **maternal and child health centre**, **which later became the Balbalà Hospital**, **also known as the 'Italian Hospital'**. Over the years, Italian cooperation has continued to improve the quality of health care at the hospital, strengthening the skills of the staff and providing equipment and materials, with particular attention to the paediatrics and maternal and child health departments.

In this context, this office was engaged in the formulation of a funding proposal to be entrusted to the United Nations agency for sexual and reproductive health (UNFPA) and the Italian CSOs present in the country, aimed at strengthening the health and protection system for women victims of violence, particularly in the Balbalà area. The initiative, worth a total of 1 MEUR, was approved in January 2023.

As regards ongoing initiatives, in 2022 AICS continued activities related to strengthening access to basic services, particularly those linked to public health and the protection of **the most vulnerable groups**.

On health emergencies, the Agency launched an initiative with the World Health Organisation (WHO) to respond to the COVID-19 pandemic and other infectious diseases, including malaria. 2022 also saw the launch of the UNICEF-implemented project on **child protection**.

Finally, in October 2022, the BIOTECHNET project was officially presented in Djibouti, implemented by the International Centre for Genetic Engineering and Biotechnology (ICGEB), in collaboration with the Ethiopian Bio and Emerging Technology Institute (BETin) and the Centre d'Etudes e de Recherche de Djibouti (CERD), which promotes the exchange and improvement of skills of Ethiopian and Djiboutian researchers in the field of Life Sciences.



South Sudan, which gained independence from Sudan on 9 July 2011, is the youngest country in the world. In civil war since 2013, South Sudan is also among **the poorest countries in Sub-Saharan Africa.**

Over time, fighting fronts have multiplied and even clans within the same ethnic groups have faced peaks of violence exacerbated by the increased availability of weapons. The population is exhausted by the consequences of the war, the lack of safety and security and its impact on food availability and basic services.

On 25 November 2022, the Humanitarian Needs Overview (HNO) 2023 was published, which predicts an alarming scenario for the coming months. In fact, it is estimated that **9.4 million people, about 76% of the population of South Sudan, will be in need of humanitarian assistance in 2023.** This represents an increase of half a million people from the previous year.

According to the INFORM Risk Index, South Sudan is in one of the worst humanitarian crises in the world, second only to Somalia, on a par with the Central African Republic, and steadily worsening. In conflict and flood-affected areas, access to food and sources of income for local communities is severely hampered by displacement, continuous disruptions to food assistance and trade flows. Food insecurity will affect about 8 million people, or 64% of the total population by the peak of the dry season, between April and July 2023.

Many of the people suffering from high food insecurity are in places with chronic vulnerabilities aggravated by frequent shocks related to climate, economic crisis, conflict and poor agricultural production.

In addition, the **downsizing of funds from the international community** has had a negative impact on the country's health services, the implementation of which is completely delegated to humanitarian organisations. The Health Pooled Fund South Sudan estimates that the reduction in funding has resulted in the lack of access to health services for 2.5 million people in 2022.

South Sudanese women and girls are at constant risk of attack while travelling to access humanitarian services, to meet family needs or while carrying out daily livelihood activities. Physical, sexual and other forms of **gender-based violence** are a reality that approximately 2.8 million people will face in 2023. About 3.7 million children and adolescents continue to be at risk of recruitment by armed groups and other forms of abuse, including abduction and human trafficking.

Although the government of South Sudan has made repeated commitments to combat sexual violence, it is still one of the tools used by the war and of which South Sudanese women and girls are victims, with the vast majority of cases going unreported due to stigma and the resulting fear of rejection by families and communities.

ITALIAN COOPERATION IN SOUTH SUDAN

The Italian Cooperation is implementing 3.1 MEUR in emergency initiatives and has allocated 7.9 MEUR in development projects in 2022.

AICS's traditional areas of intervention in South Sudan include support to the national and local health system, with a focus on disability, food security interventions and improving the education system in remote or underserved areas, all of which have brought significant results in terms of efficiency, sustainability and building the resilience of local communities.

Gender equality and nutrition are considered transversal components of all **four macro-sectors of intervention** mentioned above, even if formally included in the Basic Services macro-sector.

In all interventions, AICS has always supported the groups of people who have found themselves in a more vulnerable state as a result of the various crises in their countries of competence.

The total budget for initiatives in 2022, excluding promoted projects, is EUR **313,342,685 million**.

ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT AND JOB CREATION

The sector has a portfolio of 17 active initiatives worth approximately 130 MEUR.

The macro-sector Economic Development and Job Creation includes within it agricultural development, i.e. the improvement of the agri-food system in all its components: "from the field to the table" as well as entrepreneurial and SMEs development in both agriculture and light manufacturing.

In addition, the sector has an important component of vocational, agricultural and entrepreneurial professional education and technical training, **aimed at young people**, **particularly women**, who are preparing to enter the labour market or at government officials and entrepreneurs who wish to deepen their knowledge.

Finally, the sector includes a private sector development component, with a particular focus on innovation, business start-up creation and access to credit by SMEs.

The initiatives underway in 2022 mainly focused on **strengthening the agricultural sup-ply chains of the following products:** coffee, tomato, pineapple, avocado, moringa and wheat (hard and soft), strengthening the capacity of small-scale manufacturing, supporting female entrepreneurship and job creation for young people including through technical and vocational training, and improving the investment climate and access to credit for the private sector.

All initiatives take gender equality into account and aim to facilitate women's empowerment through the participation and inclusion of women in productive and entrepreneurial activities.

BASIC SERVICES

The sector has a portfolio of 12 initiatives worth approximately 43 MEUR.

The macro-sector on access to basic services includes activities that aim to strengthen access to public and private service delivery structures and systems that meet basic human needs, in particular health, gender and social protection. The sector also includes initiatives in the areas of nutrition and gender policies.

In 2022, this office carried out interventions in the areas of health, child protection, good governance, including supporting the strengthening of the civil registration system and women's empowerment. The sector also managed coordination with local and Italian CSOs, promoting moments of confrontation and exchange of information.

In addition, it continued to enhance gender issues in all its interventions, promoting gender mainstreaming also in the other sectors where AICS works and within the joint interventions implemented with other development partners.

With regard to **nutrition**, a new project was launched to help improve food safety and quality throughout the food chain, to ensure access to safe and nutritious food in Ethiopia. The initiative is implemented by EPHI - Ethiopian Institute of Public Health and sees the collaboration of the Carabinieri's Anti-Security and Health Units (N.A.S), involved as experts and excellence in the field.

Within its interventions, particular attention is paid to the four emerging regions of Ethiopia (Afar, Gambella, Benishangul-Gumuz, Somali), as well as to the support of health structures in Amara and SNNP.

In Ethiopia, AICS co-chairs the Oversight Committee of the Global Fund/Country Coordination Mechanism and is an active member of the Sustainable Development Goals Perfomance Fund (SDG PF), and of the Health Population Nutrition, a coordination of donors active in the field of health and nutrition. In addition, since the second half of 2022, he is co-chair of the Basic Services Delivery Group, together with the World Bank, supporting the decentralisation of basic services.

As far as the sector's activities in **Djibouti** are concerned, the Italian Cooperation has a long history in the health sector, which gives it immediate recognition with government authorities and other donors. In 2022, the sector was engaged in the launch of an initiative implemented by UNICEF to strengthen the child protection system and in the preparation of a new project (included in the 2022 programming) aimed at supporting the health system of Balbalà, a peripheral district of Djibouti Ville, and at strengthening the protection system for **women victims of violence**.

EMERGENCY AND HUMANITARIAN AID

The sector has a portfolio of 17 active initiatives in its countries of operation worth about 39 MEUR.

The Emergency Interventions macro sector has provided for actions with a regional scope in response to the humanitarian crises in **Ethiopia**, **Djibouti**, **South Sudan and Northern Uganda**, through the funding of Initiatives implemented by CSOs and UN Agencies and aimed at the provision of basic services, food security and protection activities, with the objective of improving the living conditions and integration of **vulnerable groups**, **such as internally displaced persons**, **refugees**, **migrants and returnees in their communities** of **origin or host communities**.

In 2022, AICS launched a €16.5 million call for proposals for civil society organisations to support the humanitarian response in Ethiopia and South Sudan: €7.5 million to respond to the drought in Ethiopia and €9 million to intervene in support of the South Sudanese crisis.

The initiatives financed through the Emergency in Ethiopia channel are implemented following an integrated approach in response to humanitarian crises affecting the most vulnerable segments of the population.

The main partners are Italian CSOs and consortia in which International CSOs also participate. Among the UN Agencies with which the AICS office in Addis Ababa collaborates are WHO, WFP, UNFPA and OCHA, as well as other International Organisations such as ICRC.

In continuity with previous years, in 2022 the Italian Cooperation contributed to the Ethiopian Humanitarian Fund (EHF) of OCHA, which, aligned to the Humanitarian Response Document, aims to respond to crises and disasters related to conflicts triggered by natural hazards, such as droughts, floods and epidemics.

In order to ensure coordination among the main humanitarian actors and international humanitarian donors, AICS participates in the main coordination tables among them: Humanitarian and Resilience Donor Group, Refugees Donor Group, EU+ Migration Group and as Observer within the Advisory Board of the OCHA EHF.
